INDIVISIBLE: African American Assembly

DID YOU KNOW? There are African American Assembly meetings (Indivisible) that are being held to "educate and empower" the most under-served constituency within the Sacramento community; the African-American population.

What is "Indivisible"? A diverse group of citizens who are dedicated to addressing the most pressing issues that African Americans face today. Indivisible holds monthly meetings with Mayor Kevin Johnson in which the members participate in discussion and action in the following three areas:

- Educational Achievement: Closing the achievement gap between African American students and their counterparts
- <u>Political Influence</u>: Political and civic engagement amongst African Americans
- <u>Economic Empowerment</u>: Economic well-being of the African American community



Over the past year nearly 600 African American community members have gathered at the Guild Theater to discuss the "Black Agenda." The Indivisible group has identified three key areas of focus: (1) Education, (2) Economics and (3) Politics. The next steps are to take this discussion and action to the next level. During a prior meeting the group was challenged with a simple goal: FILL THE GUILD THEATER. They have consistently averaged 130 attendees each month but have yet to fill the 200-seat theater for the monthly meeting. Why is it important to fill the theater you may ask? (1) The ultimate goal is unity. There are over 70,000 African Americans in Sacramento and the group set a challenge of bringing a small segment of our community together each month. (2) The group assigned team leaders and all agreed that they would fill the theater before the year ends. (3) Indivisible wants to create a movement and the movement will require soldiers (as the group needs to be able to prove that as a community, we can deliver soldiers).

As quoted by my colleague, Brother John Taylor (Indivisible Education Team Leader): "This is our time. This is, as my fraternity Brother Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. once said 'the fierce urgency of now', and if we don't take advantage of the momentum and begin to show ourselves relevant to ourselves, no other group with take us seriously." We must seize this unprecedented opportunity where we have the first African American President of the United States serving simultaneously with the first African American Mayor of Sacramento. We must come together and build a united front as we close out 2012. The time is now!
